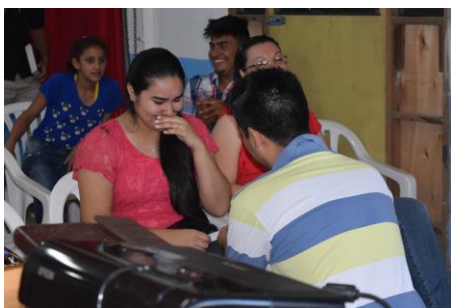

A Musical Proposal!!!



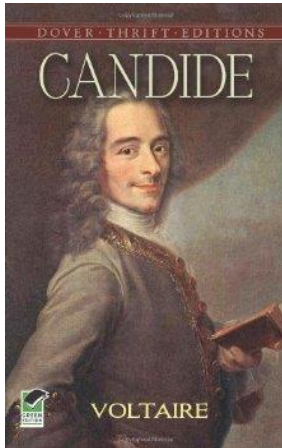

Schaefers vs. The Paraguayan Immigration Office

Over the past year, Stephen and I have struggled to get our immigration documents completed for the Paraguayan government. The repeating story is that each time we go to the immigration office, we are told we have everything except one document. This went on until one day our FBI background check from the U.S. expired. This particular document is standard for a U.S. citizen living abroad, but it is a three month process to obtain this paperwork and it includes you turning in a professional copy of your fingerprints. So, when our first FBI background check expired in April 2016, I decided to wait until Stephen and I went back to the U.S. for the assembly in July 2016 in order to save money on international shipping. In November, we finally received another updated copy of this document and proceeded to try and apply for temporary residency status in Paraguay once again. In mid-December, Stephen and I were sure we had everything we needed to successfully turn in all our paperwork. And we were right! Stephen was able to apply for his temporary residency card, but when it came to my documents there was a problem. In Paraguay, when a woman marries she doesn't necessarily change her last name...she just adds on her husband's surname. It was a matter of confusion for the Paraguayan officials to understand why my birth certificate and marriage license had my maiden name and my U.S. passport had my married name. They did not believe me when I told them the name in my birth and marriage certificates was the same person in my passport. So, here was Stephen with all his stuff turned in and I was having an identity crisis. To satisfy the immigration office, I had to go before the U.S. embassy in Paraguay to have a sworn affidavit stating my two names belonged to me. So, on Dec. 28th I went back to the immigration office and finally was able to turn in my paper and apply for my temporary residency card. Stephen and I both should receive our cards in February and I just might pose for a few pictures with mine because it's been a long, expensive, and hard fought battle to get that little thing!

What 18th century philosopher features Paraguay in one of his most famous works? What is the title?

Candide is a French satire published in 1754 by philosopher Voltaire. I personally read this fast-paced silly short novel about six months ago and was surprised the role Paraguay had to play as a main setting. The book is centered around the idea of optimism and criticises Leibnizian optimism, which is a theological based philosophy on how everything in this world is optimal because God would not create a world with such flaws and imperfections. From a philosophical standpoint, *Candide* is best read by adults firm in their faith with the Lord.
